33rd NAFA Film Festival

HAUtaldea Symposium: Alhóndiga Bilbao, Bilbao, 9-13 October 2013

CHARACTER AND DESTINY:

REFLECTIONS ON CONTEMPORARY ETHNOGRAPHIC FILM AND THE DOCUMENTARY

The points where the documentary and ethnographic film converge and diverge share a long history, dating back to the earliest musings on the use of images for anthropological research. The proliferation of areas shared by both these genres within different cultural contexts (production, screening and distribution) contrasts sharply with the impermeability across those academic disciplines (ranging from the field of Visual Anthropology, through Cultural Studies, to Cinema Studies) that mark the divide between education and analysis regarding the documentary and ethnographic film.

At this year's NAFA Festival, we wish to contribute to the debate on this issue by providing an arena for reflecting upon the contemporary audiovisual scene, and more specifically ethnographic and documentary film: two categories that are hard to delimit, but which use differentiated approaches for education and representation. So what are these approaches? What are the networks used by each one of these approaches? Under what circumstances do they converge? And

regarding the films themselves, what distinguishes an ethnographic film from a documentary? Does the fact a film is placed in one or other category depend on the director's own profile, how it was filmed, or where it is screened? And, ultimately, what contribution does anthropology make to filmmaking, and vice versa? Does documentary-making have its own intrinsic properties? If so, what are they?

The symposium therefore calls for the submission of paper proposals focusing on the relationships between contemporary ethnographic film and the documentary. The aim is to conduct an in-depth study of the traditions and genealogies (destiny) the two genres share, reveal their tendencies and their unique features, and as far as possible unravel the personality (character) of documentary film over and above its disciplinary nature.

To take part in the symposium, please submit a 400-word abstract to hautaldea@gmail.com by 20 June. Acceptance of proposals will be notified in mid-July and

will require the submission of a draft of the paper. The deadline for the submission of draft papers is 1 September 2013. Speakers will be able to include clips or visual examples as part of their presentation.

The symposium is organised by HAUtaldea in collaboration with Alhóndiga Bilbao, the Department of Philosophy and Social Anthropology at the University of the Basque Country (UPV/EHU) and the Nordic Anthropological Film Association (NAFA), and it will coincide with the 33rd NAFA Festival, to be held at Alhóndiga Bilbao (Bilbao) from 9 - 13 October 2013. The morning sessions will be given over to the symposium's presentations and papers, and the festival films will be screened in the afternoon. For further information, please visit:

News from the Commission on Visual Anthropology (CVA)

IUAES 2013, Manchester August 5-10, 2013

The CVA as a commission of the IUAES together with the Granada Centre, organizes its own programme at the IUAES 2013 Manchester Congress that will take place from the 5th till the 10th of August this summer (www.iuaes2013.org/Visual.html).

The Program consists of film screenings and a full 4 days programme with paper-presentations on a variety of themes and with the use of different types of audiovisual media, a special discussion forum on the development of academic standards for the evaluation of non-literary forms of representation, a photo-exhibitions and video-installations.

Recently the CVA has established its own Facebook page: CVA.iuaes. Like it and follow the latest news on the Visual Anthropology program through the site.

Panels

More than 90 visual anthropologists will come together to discuss their work. 5 of the 8 panels will be more specifically focussed on the moving image 1 on multimedia and 2 on the use of photography in Visual Anthropology. The panels discuss themes like: epistemology (V01 & V04), evaluation of non-literary forms in academia (V02), audiovisual media in

ethnographic research (V03 & V06), multimedia use and non-linear narratives (V05), the representation of the invisible (V07) and films on women, made by women (V09) and are listed on the website (www.nomadit.co.uk/iuaes/iuaes2013/panels.php?View=Visual).

There will be 2 parallel panel-tracks running in two adjacent theatres from 09:00 till 12:30 AM and 02:00 to 3:30 PM. Panels take up two or three sessions of 1.5 hours.

Papers and Films

For the first time in the history of the CVA panellist will upload their papers and films beforehand to allow their co-presenters in the panel to read and view their contributions in advance. After 20 July until 11 August, panellists will have the opportunity to access the films that will be discussed in their own panel using a password. During the Congress we will also offer the opportunity to access the films that belong to the other panels. The uploaded materials will only be accessible to people who have been given the password and cannot be downloaded.

The congress call for papers is now closed.

Film programme

The screening-program will take place in a third adjacent theatre. There will be a set film program that is organised on a regional basis: China, Japan, Latin America and West Africa. The conveners: Itsushi Kawase, Bao Jiang, Angela Toresan and Carlos Flores and Mouazamou Ahmadou were invited by the CVA. The different regional film programs can be viewed on the website through a link offered on the special Visual Anthropology page www.iuaes2013.org/Visual.html.

The Screening-program will consist of 4 afternoon screenings, from 02:00 to 05:30 PM) with films that reflect the 'State of the Art' in the regions. The filmmakers will be present as much as possible. The screening program will be open to all. There will be time for discussion after the screening, which we expect will focus both on the content of the films and on discourses concerning ethnographic cinema that are taking place in the specific regions.

Exhibition

There will be a photo-exhibition, exploring ways in which ethnographic and anthropological photography can find its own way of combining text and image in a

gallery-setting. In a special setting in the same building, video installations will be shown. The photo-exhibition and video-installations will be convened by Marcel Reyes Cortez.

Special Event

The programme will include a special “forum-mission” on Friday August 9, discussing the establishment of academic standards for the evaluation of non-literary forms of representation in anthropology. The aim is to produce guidelines, for academia worldwide, on what aspects to consider when evaluating and reviewing non-literary forms of representation in anthropology, in order to get these acknowledged as academic publications. A manifesto concerning this topic will be produced and distributed before the Congress, and will serve as a starting point for the discussion in the forum-mission. The discussion will be convened by Peter Ian Crawford.

Video on demand and Video booths

To enable those panellists who would like to show their full length film to colleagues outside the panels there is the possibility to share their uploaded films through a Vimeo-account. The films can be watched before the congress at home, or during the congress in ‘video-booths’ that will be arranged nearby the three theatres where the panels will take place.

For those who want to screen their productions for a larger audience, there will be the video-on demand-program. During the times that the Theatres will not be in use for panels, films will be scheduled in the theatres. The video-on demand time-schedule will be rather ad-hoc and will be made available during the Congress on screens and on the Facebook page.

Fringe Events

Different participants have suggested that they would like to organize events outside the Congress. These ‘Fringe events’ will also be announced at the Congress website and at our Facebook site. In this vein, there will be a public Women Filming Women Round Table event, and a special screening with discussion by one of the Japanese Documentary filmmakers who will present his film in the Film Programme. The Fringe-meetings will be announced on Facebook (CVA.iaes) and will also be presented in IUAES website under the link: Social Events: Visual Anthropology: Fringe Events.

NEW BOOK

Not Hollywood: Independent Film at the Twilight of the American Dream

Sherry B. Ortner

The pioneering anthropologist Sherry B. Ortner combines her trademark ethnographic expertise with critical film interpretation to explore the independent film scene in New York and Los Angeles since the late 1980s. Not Hollywood is both a study of the lived experience of that scene and a critical examination of America as seen through the lenses of independent filmmakers. Based on interviews with scores of directors and producers, Ortner reveals the culture and practices of indie filmmaking, including the conviction of those involved that their films, unlike Hollywood movies, are "telling the truth" about American life. These films

often illuminate the dark side of American society through narratives about the family, the economy, and politics in today's neoliberal era. Offering insightful interpretations of many of these films, Ortner argues that during the past three decades independent American cinema has functioned as a vital form of cultural critique.

About The Author: Sherry B. Ortner is Distinguished Professor of Anthropology at UCLA. She is the author of numerous books including *New Jersey Dreaming: Capital, Culture, and the Class of '58* and *Anthropology and Social Theory: Culture, Power, and the Acting Subject*, both published by Duke University Press.

Journal of Video Ethnography

A collaborative venture of DePaul University's Social Science Research Center and Louisiana State University's Ethnographic Video Laboratory

Statement of Purpose

The journal is dedicated to the advancement of social scientific knowledge of human societies, systems, and cultures through the use of ethnographic video and film. This journal also aspires to further the development of ethnographic video as a data collection method and as an output medium. JVE publishes ethnographic studies wherein video is/was a central methodological component and is the primary output form. Moreover, videos published in JVE will address a social scientific research question or subject/topic that is best addressed by the collection and exhibition of videographic data (as opposed to studies where video/film is incidental or

merely illustrative/supplemental). The JVE-published video must be a freestanding vehicle for the “telling of a social science story.” JVE’s editors will not consider decontextualized “clips” or videos that require text-documents to be understood. Ethnographic videos published in JVE will range widely in their substance and focus. Common to all of them will be the “rigorous” (as defined by the respective disciplines) use of video to examine and then re-present deliberately social scientific examinations of “humans doing things, and not doing things, together.”[1] JVE’s contributors will be drawn from multiple disciplines within the humanities and social & behavioral sciences, though conceivably anyone with ample ethnographic training could publish a video in the journal. The grand aim of this journal is to advance the social scientific use of video/film as a method for exploring human society and as a medium for the representation of findings from those explorations. In the course of striving to attain this goal, JVE will contribute substantially to the elucidation of much-needed standards, or criteria, by which ethnographic films can be assessed scientifically.

Statement of Need

In fits and starts “ethnographic film” has arisen in the fields of sociology and anthropology, has been adopted by practitioners in other fields (and even in the commercial sector) but has failed to “mature” as a data collection method, to be sure, but especially as a medium for the study of human culture and conveyance of scientifically-derived insights into human societies, systems, and cultures (i.e., “research findings”). One of the central reasons for its stunted growth is the lack of clear criteria against which professionals in any given field can assess an ethnographic film’s degree of “scientific rigor.” Related to the absence of “knowledge product” assessment criteria, the history of ethnographic film’s development observes repeated failure to establish parameters for the making of ethnographic research films. In short, ethnographers across disciplines

have been and continue to be uncertain regarding what constitutes an ethnographic film, how to create such a film, and how to evaluate a film purporting to be “ethnographic.”

The dual absences of (1) an ethnographic film production “movement” within or across social science disciplines and (2) a shared framework for the critical evaluation of output stem from a common source: The nonexistence of peer-review-driven publishing outlets. There is no journal of video ethnography, nor has there ever been one. JVE will be the first but certainly not last of its kind.

Peer review is the fulcrum of scientific discourse. Without a mechanism for peer review of social science knowledge products—whatever the medium—standards and production guidelines will never materialize. All submissions to JVE will be peer reviewed in a manner identical to that of print journals.

NEW BOOK

People Apart: 1950s Cape Town Revisited. Photographs by Bryan Heseltine

Foreword by Amanda Hopkinson
 Essays by Vivian Bickford-Smith and Sean Field

People Apart offers a rich and fascinating insight into South Africa at the very beginning of the apartheid era

through Bryan Heseltine's previously unpublished photography of the early 1950s.

In the late 1940s and early 1950s the South African-born, English-educated photographer Bryan Heseltine made a series of extraordinary photographs in and around Cape Town, a city in the midst of profound transformation following the rapid urbanisation of the post-war years and the election of the racist National Party government in 1948. Published for the first time in *People Apart* these photographs offer a rich and fascinating insight into South Africa at the very beginning of the apartheid era. Heseltine's carefully composed images depict aspects of social and cultural life and illustrate the diversity of Cape Town's inhabitants. The photographs are replete with historical, social and political implications; yet, at the same time, they transcend their status as documentary records of social conditions. The photographs evidence a respect for the subjects and their urban environment that ran counter to the ideology of apartheid; and Heseltine's sensitive approach gave visual expression to the emerging anti-apartheid sentiments of the period.

Through extensive biographical and socio-historical research, Darren Newbury situates Heseltine's photography within its contemporary context, exploring the circumstances in which the images were made and first shown in South Africa, and their subsequent exhibition in London in the mid-1950s. He also asks what it means to look at the images now, in the post-apartheid era. Amanda Hopkinson contributes a substantial foreword on Heseltine's photographs presented in the book. In addition, contributions from Sean Field and Vivian Bickford-Smith examine the relationship of the collection to oral history, memory and identity, and to other visual and written representations of Cape Town and its people. Film and Paradoxes of Visuality. Practicing Anthropology

Sławomir Sikora (DiG, Warsaw 2012)

The book explores crucial points of visuality and ethnographic film. This is, however, not a historical monograph, although some aspects of historical consideration can be found here. It is neither a methodological handbook nor a theoretical study. Nevertheless, it can be treated as prolegomena to theory of ethnographic film. It is the first book on ethnographic film published in Polish.
